4. What is going on in the artwork? Name at least two materials used in this work.

Sand, air, water

5. The title of this artwork by Thai artist Pratchaya Phinthong is *Algahest*. Where do you think this landscape might be? Do you think there are life forms in this place? Why do you say so?

Free response e.g. a place devoid of living things, a desert, a place with harsh weather conditions, peaks resembles sand dunes etc.

Free response e.g. no, as it seems devoid of life etc.

6. Now imagine you are able to travel out of this landscape. Give the frame a gentle push and observe the image at the back. What do you see?

Free response e.g. a large circular mass that has swirls of blue and greens, darkness everywhere else with spots of light etc.



7. What do you think you have just 'discovered'? Why do you say so?

Free response e.g. the circular mass appears to resemble Earth as the blue areas remind me of large bodies of water on Earth; outer space as there appears to be dots that resembles the galaxy etc.

8. Spin the frame again and brainstorm a list of five questions you may have about your 'discovery'.

Free response e.g. what if there were otherworldly beings also searching for life elsewhere just like us? Why does Man continue to search for life on other planets? How would existence be different if we knew where all things came from? Where is the beginning of life? When did life begin?

9. What you have just 'discovered' is Kepler-22B, a planet very far away that is very similar to Earth. Scientists have detected traces of liquid H<sub>2</sub>O on this planet. What is H<sub>2</sub>O and what does the presence of this element suggest?

It is the chemical makeup/ compound name for water and suggests the possibility of life on this planet.

10. Do you know the planets in our Solar System? List all of them here.

Mercury, Venus, Earth, Mars, Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus, Neptune, Pluto

11. What are some similarities and differences between Earth and Kepler-22B?

Similarities: appears to contain water, exists in the 'habitual zone' Differences: Kepler-22B is 2.4 times the size of Earth, average surface temperature of Kepler-22B is 22°C and that of Earth is 14°C



12. Imagine you were a scientist who had found a special way to reach Kepler-22B. What is your special mission to this planet? Upon successfully reaching this planet, what actions will you take? What does this say about human nature, or about you? Pen this down in your logbook entry:

Free response e.g.

<u>Mission</u>: to search for another planet which may be a sustainable dwelling place for human beings.

<u>Notes</u>: upon reaching this planet, I took samples of 'water' for testing and found high traces of oxygen and other new elements. Could this allude to presence of life forms on this planet? How can we make contact with this life form? Will they be interested in fair exchange and communication? These measures are necessary to ensure survival of the human species.

13. Observe a *certain portion* of this artwork in pairs. Make sure you and your classmates observe different sections of the artwork, and list down some of the things you see.

14. What are the materials used in this artwork?

Wood, iron, unfired clay

15. Throughout history, Man has always had an intrinsic relationship with animals. It may be argued that the technological progress of the Industrial Revolution has exacerbated the idea that Man is superior to animals. Do you agree with this anthropocentric statement? Why do you say so?

16. Man is also constantly inspired by nature. For example, the early designs for flight by the Italian polymath, Leonardo DaVinci, were adaptations of bat-like wings. Observe the size and length of the 'bones' in this artwork. What animal do you think the artist was inspired by in the invention of this vessel?

Whale's spine



17. What are some similarities between the 'bones' and the vessel?

The spindle-shaped and tapered ends of the boat mimic the streamline shape of the whale, the base of the boat with its ridges is akin to the whale's spine etc.

18. What are some differences between the boat and the animal that inspired its design? How has Man adapted the design of the boat to mimic characteristics of the animal?

Whereas whales have tails to propel them forward, Man has fashioned oars for this function. Whereas whales have a blowhole for breathing, Man has made the boat light enough to float above water, yet sturdy enough to withstand harsh conditions, etc.

19. The suffix '-ologist' is used to replace '-ology' at the end of nouns in order to form other nouns that refer to people who are concerned with a particular science or subject. Can you guess these professions?

A <u>SOCIOLOGIST</u> is one who specialises in the science of society, social institutions, and social relationships; specifically the systematic study of the development, structure, interaction and collective behaviour of organised groups of human beings.

An <u>ANTHROPOLOGIST</u> is one who studies the science of human beings; especially the study of human beings and their ancestors through time and space and in relation to physical character, environment and social relations and culture.

An <u>ONTOLOGIST</u> is one who studies or maps reliefs, especially of mountains.

An <u>OLFACTOLOGIST</u> is a medical specialist in the sense of smell or the study of smells.

20. What are the two main colours in the artwork? How many shades can you identify?

Yellow and black 2 shades of yellow – yellow ochre and taupe

21. What is the material of this artwork?

Wood, charcoal and beewax



22. What do you think the artist is trying to depict?

The beeswax allude to whales' earwax which is an indicator of the health of the whale and the ocean. The chemical profiles uncovered by analysis of the whales' earwax reveal internal hormonal changes which could have been induced by human activities.

23. What does this imply about our relationship between man and nature/animal?

Free response. E.g. Human actions leaves an indelible mark on nature; mankind is dependent on nature for food, medicine, shelter, clothing and other necessities; preserving nature for aesthetic and recreational purpose; spiritual connection in wilderness; as human culture changes from huntergatherer to agrarian to industrial to social complexity and professional specialisation to cultural and technological phase, wildlife went from being of a divine power, to symbolic of a divine power, to the antithesis of a divine power, to a commodity for sale, to a precious, irreplaceable source to be protected

24. Can you think of any forms in nature that exhibit such an intrinsic relationship between Man, nature and the surroundings?

Hint: you see many of them lining the streets of Singapore.

Rings on a tree trunk not only tell one about the age and physiology of the tree, but also the current environmental processes and conditions.

25. What is the title of this artwork?

26. What do you think are some characteristics of female pirates that Smart is trying to portray?
