

# HOTUNYEN 何子彦

- Ho Tzu Nyen (b. 1976) is a visual artist and filmmaker who lives and works in Singapore.
- His works often explore myths and motifs, question how history is formed, and whose stories are told.
- He focuses on communication and political movements between Asia and the West, with an emphasis on the complexities of Southeast Asia.
- Aggregation (the process of collecting information from multiple sources) plays an important role in Ho's approach to both his works and the research behind them.

Having represented Singapore at the 54<sup>th</sup> Venice Biennale (2011), Ho is one of Singapore's most recognised contemporary artists. His works have been collected internationally by institutions including the Guggenheim Museum, Tate Modern, Gwangju Biennale Foundation and SAM.

### **EXPLORING** THE EXHIBITION

#### About the exhibition

Ho Tzu Nyen: Time & the Tiger is a mid-career survey exhibition of the artist's practice, which features paintings, films, theatrical performances and video installations created in the past two decades. Ho's works often draw from historical events, documentary footage, art history, music videos and myth to investigate the construction of history, the narrative of myths and the plurality of identities.

Ho Tzu Nyen: Time & the Tiger is co-organised between Singapore Art Museum and Art Sonie Center.



#### Video Installation

Artists have been creating video installations since the 1960s. Video art is a core component of Ho's artistic practice. When you watch his videos, think about the sound, music and interactive aspects of the experience.


#### Pre-visit

#### **Hotel Aporia**

2019

#### Did You Know?

- This video installation features four main sections, each with video projections fitted to spaces that mimic the interiors of a Japanese-style inn, or *ryokan*.
- It draws on stories from various historical figures from World War II, including pilots, filmmaker Yasujiro Ozu, animator Ryuichi Yokoyama and philosophers from the Kyoto School.
- The books on display combined with correspondence between Ho and his previous Japanese collaborators form the basis of the videos in the rooms, which feature footage taken from Yasujiro Ozu and Ryuichi Yokoyama's films produced from the 1940s to 1950s.
- The faces of the actors are removed using a process called rotoscoping, which leaves behind a blank space on which viewers may imagine their own faces or that of other characters.
- In Hotel Aporia, videos are shown concurrently running on several screens, offering different perspectives. By layering these stories together, the artist juxtaposes films by Ozu and Yokoyama, inviting viewers to compare them and develop a deeper and more holistic understanding of the history that they represent.

#### The Cloud of Unknowing

2011

#### Did You Know?

- In 2011, Ho represented Singapore at the Venice Biennale with this installation, *The Cloud of Unknowing*.
- The video shows a block of Housing & Development Board (HDB) apartments on the eve of their demolition. The shifting representation of clouds in the video connects a diverse group of characters that live solitary lives in these apartments.
- In this artwork, Ho uses the motif of the cloud to explore the multifaceted history of art. He refers to clouds from a range of sources, including the works of Correggio from the Italian Renaissance, who saw clouds as a path to divine closeness; Surrealist painter René Magritte, known for his depictions of cloudladen skies; and Chinese ink painter Mi Fu, whose portrayal of cloud-wrapped mountains hints at our fleeting existence within the vast cosmos.
- With its ever-changing form, the cloud serves as a metaphor that reminds us that reality is not always as it seems.



#### Think!

- How did the artist depict clouds in the video?
- If you could recreate this artwork, what approach would you take? How would you represent a cloud? Compare your answer with a friend.
- This video and some of Ho's other artworks feature blank screens from time to time. Why do you think the artist chose to include these moments of blankness?

#### T for Time: Timepieces

2023-ongoing

39 flatscreens (various dimensions), apps and videos, various durations (1 sec to infinite)

Co-commissioned by Singapore Art Museum and Art Sonje Centre with M+ Hong Kong, in collaboration with Museum of Contemporary Art Tokyo and Sharjah Art Foundation



#### Did You Know?

- T for Time: Timepieces is a collection of Ho's notes and speculations on time. This
  work encompasses a variety of themes, from symbols and concepts of time to
  timekeeping traditions in Asia and the West.
- Each of the timepieces functions as an emblem of time. These range from short video loops of 15 seconds to apps that operate in cycles ranging from 24 hours to 165.8 earth years (the equivalent of a year on Neptune).
- Collectively, *T for Time* and *T for Time: Timepieces* represent Ho's model for a prospective machine that continuously generates new stories, speculations and hallucinations of time in real time.


#### Did You Know?

- Unfolding across two screens that face each other, One or Several Tigers is a
  video installation featuring a surreal duet between a Malayan tiger and
  George Drumgoole Coleman, the Irish architect and road surveyor who helped
  to shape modern Singapore.
- Throughout the duet, it becomes increasingly unclear who is singing as the two identities begin to merge. This transformation represents the possibility of becoming something else, apart from ourselves.
- Tigers and weretigers represent Southeast Asian's cosmologies and the shapeshifters who populate Ho's body of work.
- Comprising of videos, moving screens and wayang kulit, or Javanese shadow puppets, Ho's One or Several Tigers combines traditional and technological art forms to convey a tale that is situated in the past and yet still relevant to people of the present.

- What do you think the tiger represents? (It may have more than one meaning!)
- Why do you think the artist chose to use two screens instead of one? How did it shape your experience of the artwork?
