The artist Charles Lim used to be a national sailor. His works often show his deep interest in contemporary waterways and how they represent issues of mobility, migration and ecological concerns.

DID YOU KNOW?

In science, progress and knowledge gained in scientific research sometimes come from mistakes, rather than successes. Take the Post-It note for example. A researcher in a laboratory wanted to create a strong, sticky glue but mistakenly made a glue that does not stick very well instead. Years later, his colleague at work discovered that this less sticky substance can hold up pieces of paper as bookmarks for his book without leaving any residue or mark on the paper, which led to the invention of the Post-It note that is widely used today.

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




Now, come out of SAM and head over to 8Q at SAM, located on Queen Street.
